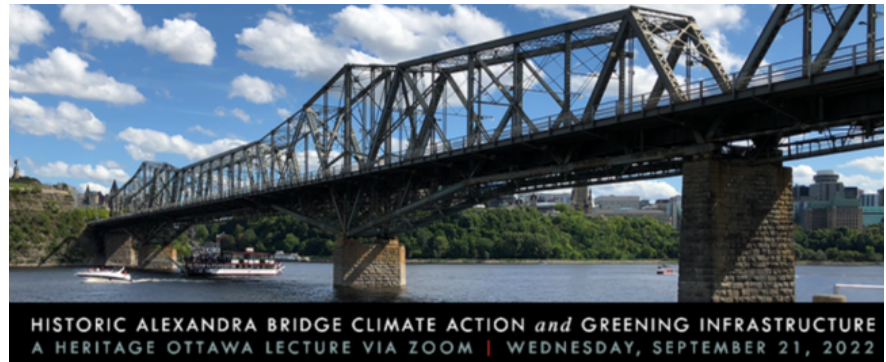




ANNUAL REPORT

VISION

Heritage Ottawa envisions a city that values its heritage resources, integrates them into all planning decisions and ensures their contribution to Ottawa's liveability. We see a future where investment in the conservation of heritage buildings, historic neighbourhoods, cultural landscapes and other places that matter to communities is embraced as the smart cultural and sustainable choice for the city.

MISSION

Heritage Ottawa is an award-winning, volunteer driven, not-for-profit organization that champions the protection and stewardship of Ottawa's built heritage and cultural places, celebrating their value in enriching our shared environment.

Heritage Ottawa is a Registered Charity and the largest organization in Ottawa devoted exclusively to this cause.

SAVING PLACES

Members of the Advocacy Committee donated nearly 1,500 hours of their time researching and responding to a record number of advocacy matters.

- 30 written and oral submissions to the City of Ottawa's **Built Heritage Committee** on applications under the *Ontario Heritage Act* and on *Official Plan*, Site Plan Control and Zoning By-law amendments. This work also involved pre-planning meetings with community groups and heritage representatives, and occasionally with developers.
- 20 local community consultations or town halls on properties such as **St Brigid's Centre for the Arts**, **Lansdowne 2.0**, and the **New Ottawa Hospital**.
- Numerous meetings and interventions on the worrisome provincial **Bills 23, 108 and 109** that erode the protection of built heritage under the OHA, compromise municipal councils' ability to develop planning and rezoning strategies, and end third party appeals to tribunals by community groups, eliminating their ability to challenge heritage, planning and re-zoning decisions.
- Consultations, interventions and ongoing monitoring of federal properties such as **Tunney's Pasture**, **Alexandra Bridge**, **Central Experimental Farm**, **Heron Road**, **Wellington Street**, and **Block 2 of the Parliamentary Precinct**.
- A new video created to help raise awareness about the need for protective legislation to prevent further encroachment on the Central Experimental Farm.
- A series of bilingual questions developed for candidates in advance of the **Municipal Election** with a focus on protection and investment in Ottawa's heritage assets, picked up by Capital Heritage Connexion and the media.



- Responded to numerous requests for interviews pertaining to local heritage-related issues and government neglect related to the deteriorated condition and future of **24 Sussex Drive**.
- Collaborated with heritage organizations to study and recommend amendments to the draft of **Federal Bill C-23**, the long awaited *Historic Places of Canada Act*.

STAYING CONNECTED

Heritage Ottawa was grateful to receive the **2023 Heritage Day Proclamation** from Mayor Sutcliffe in recognition of our steadfast advocacy efforts and keeping the public connected with in-person and virtual events, despite the challenges of the pandemic. What an honour!

WEBSITE

- Heritage Ottawa continued to maintain an engaging bilingual website essential to our outreach activities. Sections with heritage news, activities, programs, events and resources are regularly updated with new content, which is promoted via E-Bulletins and social media.
- Continued use of online registration/payment function that improved efficiencies significantly.

E-COMMUNICATIONS

- 33 E-Bulletins, E-Messages and Media Releases (via MailChimp) covering heritage-related news and activities were sent out that received over 25 requests for media interviews.
- Facebook & Twitter: 9,538 followers with an organic post reach of 164,775.
- YouTube: Lectures, CEF video, and more, uploaded for a total of 2,064 views.
- Partnership with the University of Ottawa Community Engagement Team to develop a student placement in support of social media strategy.

QUARTERLY NEWSLETTER

- 4 issues of the full-colour, 12-page Newsletter were produced and made available to members in hard copy and online.
- An extensive archive of back issues dating to 1974 is available to the public at heritageottawa.org/publications.
- For the first time, two sponsors were recruited to support the publication, **Everest Restoration** and **Perfect Books**.



RAISING AWARENESS

WALKING TOURS

- Heritage Ottawa delivered another successful season of 12 walking tours of which one was in French and six were sold out.
- Continued to use the popular online registration/payment system put in place to meet COVID challenges.
- Along with old favourites and refreshed tours, two new tours were offered: *Monuments*, *National Belonging*, *Contested Memories* and *Around the World in Sandy Hill*.
- 494 people registered for the tours.

LECTURE SERIES

- Heritage Ottawa presented 10 free lectures, including one as part of the Annual General Meeting 2022.
- Lecture topics covered a range of subjects including new conservation tools, systemic challenges, heritage landscapes and "Emerging Scholars" student presentations.
- The online format has increased participation significantly with 743 participants plus 1,004 YouTube views, for a total of 1,747 views.

PARTNERSHIPS

- Heritage Ottawa supported and participated in Heritage Day, Doors Open Ottawa, Jane's Walks, and Ottawa Regional Heritage Fair.
- After a two-year hiatus due to COVID, Heritage Ottawa partnered with Ottawa Local Immigration Partnership (OLIP) to host a series of guided bilingual walks in Chinatown, the Byward Market, Vanier and Little Italy.
- A new partnership was created with the University of Ottawa Community Engagement Team to help strengthen Heritage Ottawa's social media strategy.
- Participation in the Mayor's Task Force on Heritage, the Ottawa Cultural Alliance, the Alexandra Bridge Coalition, Lowertown Leaders Table on the future of St. Brigid's, the university-led research partnership *Quality in Canada's Built Environment: Roadmaps to Equity, Social Value and Sustainability*.



ORGANIZATIONAL SUSTAINABILITY

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Refined and formalized a public recruitment process for the Board of Directors.
- 17-member board evenly split between men and women that includes representation from equity seeking communities, namely francophone, rural and youth with three young professionals.
- Supervised part-time Administrative Officer, Jennifer Fink.
- Committee struck to review and update By-laws.
- Developed a new three-year Strategic Plan, informed by an extensive member survey and supported by an Action Plan.
- 2022 online Annual General Meeting attracted 80 member participants.

MEMBERS AND DONORS

- Heritage Ottawa ended the fiscal year with 582 members, representing a 5.2% increase over the previous year.
- Three fundraising campaigns were undertaken that generated 200 donations from 160 donors.
- Donations from members and non-members increased by 46.2%, including donations from board members amounting to \$5,025.
- Three member/donor-only events were organized in recognition of their support.
- The Heritage Ottawa Endowment Fund was formally launched at the Ottawa Community Foundation.
- Successfully attracted two new sponsorships in support of Newsletter production.
- Transitioned to online banking and online bookkeeping to streamline and improve financial oversight.
